1. By proclamation of July 14, 1945, the President of the United States, acting under the authority of the Alien Enemy Act of 1798 (50 U.S.C. 21-24), has prescribed the following regulations, additional and supplemental to those prescribed by earlier proclamations:

"All alien enemics now or hereafter interned within the continental limits of the United States pursuant to the aforesaid proclamations of the President of the United States who shall be deemed by the Attorney General to be dangerous to the public peace and safety of the United States because they have adhered to the aforesaid enemy governments or to the principles of government thereof shall be subject upon the order of the Attorney General to removal from the United States and may be required to depart therefrom in accordance with such regulations as he may prescribe."

- 2. Pursuant to the above proclamation and based upon the evidence considered at your earlier alien enemy hearing or hearings, it has been determined that you should be removed and repatriated to the country of your nationality as soon as arrangements for your transportation can be made.
- 3. You are hereby notified that prior to the issuance of a final order for your removal and repatriation you are entitled to a hearing before a hearing board appointed by the Attorney General. If you request a hearing as hereinafter provided, you will be accorded an opportunity to appear in person and to present evidence to show that you are not dangerous to the public peace and safety of the United States because of your adherence to an enemy government or to the principles of government thereof, or to show mitigating or extenuating circumstances in your case which you believe should constitute a valid reason why you should not be ordered repatriated.
- 4. You may obtain a hearing before a repatriation hearing board by executing in triplicate the form of Acknowledgment of Notice and Request for Alien Enemy Repatriation Hearing which will be given to you and by transmitting it to an official of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in charge of your custody within 10 days of receipt of this notice. If a written request is not made on this Acknowledgment form within 10 days of receipt of this notice, you are advised that the Attorney General will enter a final order for your removal from the United States and repatriation to the country of your nationality. If you request a hearing on this Acknowledgment form within the prescribed time you will be notified of the place and time of the hearing. A member of your family or any other individual may accompany you during your appearance before the hearing board and you may have witnesses appear and testify on your behalf or submit affidavits or other documentary material on your behalf.

If you do not wish a hearing you are required to indicate that fact on the prescribed Acknowledgment form.



DEAR SIR:

IN RESPONSE TO YOUR REQUEST OF NOVEMBER 19, 1943, THAT A HEARING BE GRANTED THE ABOVE SUBJECTS, I WISH TO ADVISE THAT I MADE YOUR INFORMATION AVAILABLE TO MESSRS. MULTOONEY AND TOOLE AND ASKED THEM TO CONDUCT HEARINGS ON THESE JAPATSE. THE FINDINGS IN THESE CASES ARE SUBMITTED HEREWITH TOETHER WITH THE VARIOUS FILES FORWARDED TO THIS OFFICE.

YOU WILL NOTE THAT THESE WERE VERY DIFICULT CASES AND I READILY AGREE WITH MESSRS. TOOLE AND MULROONE THAT THEY WERE IN RATHER A DIFFICULT POSITION TO PASS JUDGEMEN ON THESE JAPANESE. I ALSO AGREE WITH THEM IN THEIR RECOMMENTION THAT THERE ARE PROBABLY FACTS IN THIS CASE THAT HAVE NEVERBEEN RE— (b)(6) VARIOUS JAPANESE HAVE CONSISTENTLY MAINTAINED THAT THE WERE INNOCENT OF WRONGDOING AND THAT THEY ARE BEING PERSECUTO MERELY BECAUSE THEY WERE LEADERS AND WERE TRYING TO COOPERATE THAT THE AUTHORITIES EVEN WHEN THEY MADE OFFICIAL COMPLAINTS ABOT CERTAIN FAULTS WITHIN THE CAMP. I DO WISH TO STATE THAT I AM THER IMPRESSED WITH THE FACT THAT ALL FOUR OF THESE JAPANESHAVE BEEN VERY COOPERATIVE AND HAVE MAINTAINED AN EXCELLENT ATTITY SINCE

THESE FOUR MEN HAVE BEEN AMONG OUR HARDEST REERS AND ARE STILL CARRYING ON IN THE SAME MANNER.

INSTANCE, OFFERED TO TAKE OVER OUR GARDENING PROJECT, AND ID A WONDERFUL JOB FOR US, WHICH WAS OF DECIDED BENEFIT TO THE S.

GOVERNMENT. I THEREFORE CANNOT UNDERSTAND WHY THESE MEN DULD BE SUCH DANGEROUS TROUBLEMAKERS AT MANZANAR, AND SUCH MODELNTERNEES AT FORT MISSOULA.

IF THESE MEN ARE NOT PAROLED. I CERTAINLY FETTHAT

IMMEDIATE ACTION SHOULD BE TAKEN TO PERMIT

JOINED WITH HIS FAMILY, AS HE HAS PATIENTLY WAITED FOR MONTH AND

RAYMOND HIROSHI HIRAI, JAPANESE INTERNEE Fort Missoula, Montana December 10, 1943

PRESENT: Board Nembers (Examining Officers):

MR. MULRONEY TO ALIEN:

Q. You are Raymond Hiroshi Hirai?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Hew old are you?

A. 41 years.

Q. You were born in Japan?

A. Yes, in January, 1902.

Q. When did you first come to the United States?

A. 1917, August 1st.

Q. How much education did you have in Japan before coming to this country.

A. Just grammar school, sixth grade in other words.

Q. After coming to this country what schooling did you have?

A. College, sir.

Q. Where did you go?

A. South Jordan, Utah.

Q. After that?

A. Jordan High School, Sandy. Later transferred to Eastside High School, Salt Lake City.

Q. Did you graduate from high school?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Where did you go after high school?

A. I went to college at Ogden, Utah.

- Q. How many years?
- A. Only about 8 months.
- Q. After that?
- A. Cornell University, Ithaca, New York.
- Q. Did you get any degree at college?
- A. Yes, sir. B.A.
- Q. How many years were you in college?
- A. Three years.
- Q. From Cornell where did you go?
- A. I did not go to any more school.
- Q. Where did you go to live?
- A. Sunnyside, Utah.
- Q. How did you obtain means, that is, money to go through Cornell?
- A. My father sent me and I worked as other school boys.
- Q. Was your father in this country or in Japan?
- A. Yes, sir. This country. He is not now but he was.
- Q. He helped you financially to go through school?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Where did you say you lived after you left Cornell?
- A. Sunnyside, Utah.
- Q. What was your occupation there?
- A. I worked in the coal mines, sir.
- Q. For how long?
- A. About 2 years, sir.
- Q. As a common laborer?
- A. No, sir. As a motor man and machine helper.
- Q. From there where did you go?
- A. Hollywood, California.
- Q. Hollywood?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you have a job in Hollywood before you went to Hollywood?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How did you obtain the job?
- A. Central Casting Bureau was looking for applicants and I applied.

- Q. What was your occupation in Hollywood?
- A. Extra at first. A movie extra.
- Q. What year was that?
- A. It was 1929.
- Q. Did you make enough to live on?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you do bit parts from time to time.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Where did you live during that period.
- A. Well, 2480 Canyon Drive, Hollywood.
- Q. Was that a Japanese settlement?
- A. No, sir. It was Canyon Drive.
- Q. For how many years were you thus employed in Hollywood?
- A. Ever since.
- Q. Ever since?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. As an actor?
- A. Yes, actor, technician, production manager.
- Q. What was your salary there?
- A. Well, when I was an extra I get about \$7.50. Later \$10.00 since 1934.
- Q. That is, per day?
- A. Yes, sir. If I get any better parts I get \$10.00 extra for each close-up.
- Q. In the early part of your answer when you said you were paid \$7.50, you meant \$7.50 per day?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. You were in that vocation when you were picked up by the Immigration Authorities?
- A. No.
- Q. What were you doing then?
- A. They don't use any more Japanese players since 1939, sir.
- Q. Since 1939 what did you do?
- A. I was working as a restaurent waiter.

- Q. For whom did you work?
- A. Jim's Cafe. Jim Emomoto.
- Q. Is that in Hollywood?
- A. No, in los Angeles
- Q. What was your salary there.
- A. \$18.00 per week.
- Q. During that period did you live in the same place?
- A. No.
- Q. You had to move?
- A. I moved to 4582 Main Street, Los Angeles.
- Q. Have you ever been married?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Have you any brothers or misters in this country?
- A. Yes, sir. I have a brother, no sister, one brother.
- Q. Is your brother older or younger than you?
- A. Younger.
- Q. Where is your brother?
- A. I don't know. I lost track of him since the war.
- Q. Was he here at the time the war started?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Do you know as to whether or not he went back to Japan?
- A. I don't think so, sir, because he was born in this country.
- Q. Your brother was born in this country?
- A. Yes, sir. Sandy, Utah, 1914, August 11.
- Q. Have you any sisters in this country?
- A. No.
- Q. Have you any brothers or sisters in Japan?
- A. No.
- Q. You had but one brother and no sisters?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did your father come to this country at the same time you did?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Was he here before you?
- A. Yes.

Q. How many years was he herebefore you came?

A. When I was 100 days old my father left Japan. Sometime in 1902 about April.

- Q. Did your mother come with him.
- A. No, mother come in 1913.
- Q. Did you come with her?
- A. No.
- Q. Before her?
- A. After two years.
- Q. Has your father passed away?
- A. Yes.
- 4. And your mother?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You have no family here, not knowing where your brother is?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Now, will you tell us in regard to being taken into custody by the Immigration Authorities. After the Pearl Harbor incident?
- A. (no answer)
- Q. Perhaps you don't understand. Did the officers pick you up?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. How did you come to be in the custody of the Immigration Service?
- A. Here is the story. It was warch 22, 1942. Then the U. S. Government put someone in Relocation Center in Manzanar. At that time it was run by the Civilian Control Administration. The man was looking for volunteers. So I went on the day of March 21, 1942.
- Q. Did I hear you say you were not forced to go?
- A. Of course not, sir.
- Q. How many were in that camp?
- A. About 93 was there when I get there.
- Q. How many after that?
- A. Nearly 600 for our group. One train load. I don't know exact number but something like that.
- Q. At any rate, you went there in March, 1942?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. How long did you stay there?
- A. Until the December 6, 1942.
- Q. At which time you were taken to Moab?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How many people were there during the summer and fall?
- A. Nearly about 9 8,000.
- Q. Will you refer to an incident that happened there? About December 5, 1942. Do you know something about that incident that happened there?
- A. Yes.
- Q. When I speak of Fred Toyama, do you know who that is?
- A. Hes, he is a personal friend of mine, sir.
- Q. Won't you go ahead in your own way. Take your time and tell us with as much detail as you care to all about that incident and anything that you had to do with it, if anything?
- A. Well, I haven't any connections with whatever happened. But I was inside the police station at the time the incident occurred.
- Q. You were in the police station?
- A. Yes, inside the police station.
- Q. What was the incident?
- A. Later we so many reasons. I was not concerned in it. We studied later the first was because of the main incident which is a sugar shortage.
- Q. Did you learn on that day that this Fred Toyama had been assaulted?
 A. Yes, the next morning, sir.
- Q. Did you have anything to do with that? You had heard had you that some masked men beat him up?
- A. Yes, I heard that.
- Q. Were you one of them?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Do you know who they were?
- A. No, sir. We try to find out but we can't find who the leaders were. The way I heard some young kids 17-16 years old.
- Q. You heard they were 16-17 years old? The ones who did it?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. But you don't know the names of the 16-17 year old kids?
- A. No, sir.

- Q. You had nothing to do with it yourself?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Where were you when that happened?
- A. I was in my apartment, sir.
- Q. Was that the first knowledge you had that it happened?
- A. I was at Mr. Jee Blamey's apartment. He was a newspaper man, sir.
- Q. Was that at the camp?
- A. Yes, sir. In the Camp Barracks two eleven one.
- Q. Is Joe Blamey a Japanese man?
- A. Yes, sir. A half-breed, sir. Half Japanese, half Irish or something.
- Q. Is he a newspaper man?
- A. Editor. Editor of the Manganar Free Press.
- Q. Is that a daily paper?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You say you were in his apartment?
- A. In his apartment.
- Q. How did you hear of the incident?
- A. Some other peporter came in his room to tell us that some one beat up Toyama.
- Q. Was anyone else there?
- A. A few other persons.
- Q. Then did you go out?
- A. I was stayed there.
- Q. About what time of the day or evening was that?
- A. It was pretty late in the evening, sir.
- Q. Did you leave the apartment at all that evening?
- A. Yes, I came home.
- Q. You went from Blamey's apartment to your own home?
- A. To my own, to tell my roommates what happened, what I heard.
- Q. Then you went to bed?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What occurred the next morning?
- A. I usually sleep late. I have a habit of sleeping until noon. I didn't get up until noon. Never get up until 11:30 in the morning. Even here I sleep late.

Q. When you got up, what did you do?

- A. I went into Mess Hall, then I heard the peoples talking about what happened last night. Well -
- Q. Was there a mass meeting?
- A. No.
- Q. Was there one at noon? A mass meeting during the noon hour or about 1 o'clock?
- A. I don't know, sir.
- Q. Where were you?
- A. I was in my room.
- Q. About 1 o'clock?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was there any mass meeting that afternoon or evening?
- A. The way I heard they had mass meeting.
- Q. How did you hear they had a mass meeting? Did someone tell you?
- A. Later in the police station I learn there had been a mass meeting.
- Q. You didn't hear the noise of a mass meeting?
- A. Yes, sir. When they come across to administration building I heard the noise.
- Q. You didn't leave your room?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. You did not attend any mass meeting?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. You did not make any talk? You took no part in any mass meeting?
- A. No.
- Q. At Camp Mansanar did you have something to do with the dramatic features of the camp.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What did you have to do with that?
- A. I was director of dramatics, sir.
- Q. Who placed you in that position?
- A. Mr. Nielson, sir.
- Q. Was he one of the officers at the camp?
- A. Yes, one of the officers in charge of the recreation department, sir.

- Q. Did you continue in that position during all of the time you were in Manzanar?
- A. No, sir. I had 2 jobs in Manzanar. One was Block Leader of Block 2.
- Q. The other one?
- A. Director of dramatics.
- Q. You did not continue to be director of dramatics?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. What caused you to discontinue that?
- A. I was suspended.
- Q. Way?
- A. Because someone else made a complaint, sir.
- Q. What was the complaint?
- A. Well, because I had heated argument with Mr. Nash, Project Director.
- Q. What was the argument about?
- A. Well, we figure this way. When one of the U. S. Government came into Manzanar and they promise to build a theatre and amusement hall. They started to build but Mr. Nash stopped it.
- Q. You did not like that?
- A. That is why I went to complain to Mr. Nash. Mr. Nash said if any man comes in to complain to this office I will kill him and bury in the sand so nobody know the difference. He said he had authority.
- Q. He told you that?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was anyone else present when he told you that?
- A. Yes, sir. Miss Barber, one of the secretaries.
- Q. Mr. Nash's secretary? Was she Japanese?
- A. No, American.
- Q. There was no other person who heard that?
- A. We talk so loud I guess all the people in the next room heard that.
- Q. You made that statement to the Immigration authorities and the FBI, did you?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. I have it here but I don't see where you told them that?
- A. Nobody asked me that question.

MR. FRASER:

He has never had a hearing

- Q. Were you interviewed by the Mansanar authorities.
- A. Yes.

MR. MULRONEY TO ALIEN:

- He. Have you ever told anyone before today that Mr. Nash said that if anyone complained he would kill him.
- A. Yes, I talk to Joe Blamey, Pressman and Er. Raymond Best, Project Director of -
- Q. You told him? Anyone else?
- A. I told Mr. O'connor. He came to Moab.
- Q. Was Mr. O'Connor an officer of the law? From the FBI?
- A. He just come in Meab and ask us few questions.
- Q. You told him that too?
- A. Yes.
- Q. At the time you went into Mr. Nash's office was "r. Temple there?
- A. He was in the next room.
- Q. How many times did you go into Mr. Nash's office?
- A. Only 2.
- Q. Did you have any weapon in your hand either time?
- A. Not the first time, sir.
- Q. Was it when you went there the first time that Mr. Nash made the remark about killing someone?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Then you went out?
- A. No, sir. I talk plenty that time.
- Q. You were there a second time?
- A. Yes, two times, sir.
- Q. After awhile you went out?
- A. I didn't go out. Mr. Nash ran out.
- Q. After he ran out did you then leave Mr. Nach's office?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How long before you came back?
- A. I went in Recreation Department then. The secretary told me that Mr. Nielson think I am not fit to run the dramatic department so

then Mr. Mitani head of me. He music director. We had a meeting just a little before, present Mr. Nielson, Mr. Thomas Temple, few other relocation leaders. We select our own entertainment chief, Albert Nagashima. We don't want any new boss in our department.

- Q. I am trying to ask how long an interval passed from the time you left Mr. Nash's office until you went back?
- A. About 25 minutes.
- Q. When you went back the secon time then, after 25 minutes, did you have any weapon or anything in your hand.
- A. No weapon but a rock.
- Q. How big was the rock?
- A. About the size of a grapefruit.
- Q. Where did you get the rock?
- A. I mlways keep it in my room, sir.
- Q. Why do you always keep the rock in your room?
- A. Because I am a collector of petrified stones and rocks, even in here, sir.
- Q. You left your room to go to Mr. Nash's office?
- A. No, I didn't go to Mr. Nash's office I went to Nielson's office.
- Q. Before you left the room did you have the rock in your hand?
- A. Yes, I always carry the rock most of the time. Nice shape. Streak in it. I still have the rock here now.
- Q. You had the rock in your hand when you went to Kr. Nielson's office?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Who did you find in the office?
- A. The secretary and about 10-15 other boys and girls.
- Q. Who did you speak to in the office?
- A. The secretary and I don't --- I forget her name. Another fellow, a girl -
- Q. I don't care about them. Was Mr. Temple there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Mr. Nielson? Mr. Nash?
- A. No, because they are in Nielson's office. Their office in different building.
- Q. Who did you go there to see?
- A. Mr. Thomas Temple.

- Q. Was he there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was that in the administration building?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you go inside the rail? Was their a railing there?
- A. I went in from the front door. Passed through the cashier's room and Mr. Hopper's room.
- Q. Did you strike the railing with the rock?
- A. I did not strike anything, but there was a few times when I struck the railing with the rock when I was talking
- Q. Were you mad?
- A. I wasn't mad that time because I am made before when I had heated argument with Nash.
- Q. The first time you were there you didn't have the rock?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. Did you speak in a loud angry manner the second time?
- A. Yes.
- Q. When you had the rock what were you mad about?
- A. Because Mr. Nielson, Mr. Temple said he don't know anything about it. So I told him you are the man who did all this. Mr. Temple said nothing he just put his hands out and looked upward. Then later he said what made you think so. Then I tell him Mr. Nielson is to nice a kind of a man. He is not the kind of man to say such things.
- Q. Is that about all of the incident? Did two of your friends take you out of the room then?
- A. Yes, and out of the door.
- Q. Did you then go back into the room a second time?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Did Mr. Nielson come into the room while you were there?
- A. Yes. Mr. Nielson was standing by the door.
- Q. Did you then go to the recreation room?
- A. No, sir. I went directly home.
- Q. At some time did you go to the recreation room after this incident and did you speak there to a group of young women, and did you tell them that you turned Mr. Temple's desk over.
- A. No.

Q. Did anything like that happen?

- A. No. I told them, almost everybody, that we had heated argument and looked like I was discharged.
- Q. After you had the heated argument were you discharged?
- A. No, I was still director of dramatics but looks like I am about to say good-bye to you all, girls etc.
- Q. We have a report here that after this incident, when you had the rock in the office, that you addressed a group of young women. Is that right?
- A. Yes, in the recreation department.
- Q. Did you tell those young women that you had turned Mr. Temple's desk over?
- A. No, sir. I did not.
- Q. Did you tell them that you were going to Kill Nash by hitting him over the head with a rock.
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Is there any truth in that?
- A. No, that proved by the court in Mansanar. It isn't true.
- Q. You were tried for that, weren't you?
- A. No, not exactly.
- Q. What were you tried for? You say it was proved in court?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q.. Were you tried before the Manzanar Judiciary Committee?
- A. Yes, sir. One thing I would like to say. This is the most important part. I had the argument with Mr. Mash because we had no 4th of July celebration at Mansanar in 1942. They should have. There was one reason, it was that Dr. Matini (Matani) who is in charge of the music department refused to play the Star Spangled Banner.
- Q. You were not pleased by that fact?
- A. No. I went up to Mr. Mash same day and told him why don't we have it. The Japanese in Manzanar at least half are pro-American. Why don't we have Spangled Banner in our 4th of July celebration? You guys squeaked too much to Mr. Mash. There is going to be no celebration. We let you all work. Funny thing. Newspaper print we had 4th of July celebration in Manzanar and people from outside come to join. The army chase out of the gates. Newspaper print that we had a 4th of July celebration and the people came and were stopped outside the gates by the soldiers.

- Q. But that wasn't true?
- A. Yes, it was true.
- Q. But you didn't have the celebration?
- A. No, sir. Because I was supposed to be in charge of it. It was stopped because I had argument with Nash.
- Q. Getting back to our previous question what were you tried for?
 A. There is another thing I would like to say a few words about.
 During time of my conversation with Nash he say you are just like a man like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together. That's me he said. Better be quiet otherwise I bury you in the sand. There going to be no 4th of July celebration but we let you work.
- Q. Did he mean that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together?

 A. Yes, that what he tell me. That's why I said you are a damn liar.

 That's what the argument was.
- Q. Did you have the rock in your hand then?
- A. No. Not that time.
- Q. Was it the first or second time.
- A. This was the second.
- Q. Did you have the rock the time Mr. Mash made that remark?
- A. Yes, but Mr. Wash wasn't in the office. He was in San Francisco or somewhere else.
- Q. You said that Mr. Nash said to you that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Was that the day you went there with the rock in your hand?
- A. Same afternoon, sir.
- Q. Did you have the rock in your hand when he made the remark to you.
- A. No.
- Q. That would have been the first time you were in his office that day.
- A. Yes.
- Q. You went back afterward and had the rock in your hand the second time.
- A. Yes.
- Q. Mr. Nash wasn't there when you went back?
- A. No.
- Q. That was about 25 minutes after the first time?
- A. Yes.

- Q. After you went out the first time you went back to your apartment and got the rock?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Then you went back to the office.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Nash was not in the office when you went back with the rock the second time?
- A. Yes, he was not there.
- Q. Was Mr. Temple there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. After Nash told you on your first visit there that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin you got mad and said 'you are a damn liar'. Then you went back to your apartment?
- A. No, I went back to the recreation hall.
- Q. Where did you have the rock?
- A. In my room, sir.
- Q. When you went to Nash's office the first time where was the rock?
- A. It was in my room.
- Q. Then when was it you went out of the office?
- A. It was in the morning second -
- Q. Take it easy now, don't misunderstand me. I understood you to say early in your testimony that after your first visit at the office it was about 25 minutes before you went back to that office.
- A. That is correct. Yes, sir.
- Q. During your first visit to the office the rock was in your apartment.

 Then you went out of the office at the end of the first visit.
- A. Yes.
- Q. When you went back about 25 minutes afterward and you had the rock.

 So you must have gone to your apartment to get the rock?
- A. True, sir. One thing you misunderstand. 25 minutes I go back room. I After I left Mr. Nash's office I went to my apartment and got the rock and then I went to Mr. Temple's office in 25 minutes. It was not until the afternoon that I went back to Nash's office.
- Q. Was Mr. Nash in his office when you went back in the afternoon?
- A. No.
- Q. He had gone to San Francisco. He was not in the camp?
- A. Yes.

- Q. You were tried for doing all this in the Manzanar Judiciary Committee?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What were the charges against you?
- A. Disorderly conduct.
- Q. Were you found guilty, or not guilty?
- A. Was found guilty and one day in jail.
- Q. Did you serve one day in jail?
- A. There was a government man there and one of the agentssfrom San Francisco heard my story. He said I don't have to stay in jail but said we would like you to go out. I am not guilty of charge or sentence. He said after the trial was over the chief of judiciary committe, Mr. Campbell, told me it was not enough evidence to convict so said I set you free. Have you got anything to say? So I told him it is not justice. True I admit I carry rock in administration building so I got to be guilty. I got to be convicted because I admit I am guilty. As long as we make a judiciary committee in Manzanar we got to follow, we have to carry it out.
- Q. You were tried on a morals charge? Did they find you guilty?
- A. No. Frame-up. They told me wait outside while -
- Q. Did they also tell you that you were barred for a period of 8 months from having anything to do with dramatics or entertainment?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. It is said that you violated that order, that you did take some part in entertainment?
- A. I did. This is the way. This is the whole thing. Got to tell everything true I did, sir, because we had entertainment for the time when Mr. Merritt arrive I go personally to Mr. Merritt. Lots of undercurrents go on in Manzanar. Some day they would bust up. So the best way I told him I am supposed to be carrying on my performance in Manzanar until April.
- Q. Who did you say that to.
- A. To Mr. Merrit. I explain to him I had trouble with Nash. Mr. Merritt said it is all right I give you special permission for putting on show. I told him, I ask Mr. Merritt, you come to that show be sure at 8 o'clock. The minute I arrive I introduce you to all the people than I ask you to come on the stage and have a few words for us. He says I give you permission. He came November 28 or 29 about a week before the riot happens. It was Saturday night, I guess.

- Q. You know that we are at war with Japan?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How do you feel about that? Who do you want to win? You can talk to us frankly.
- A. It was very funny. You see sometime I hope Japan to win, sometime I hope United States to win. I was born in Japan. I am subject to Japan by birth. I come to this country when I was 15 years old. I don't know any much of Japan but I live in this country 26 years continuously. That is why lots of time when I was in the picture show, when I went in the show and saw the American flag I always clap my hands and stand up. Lots of people are accusing me I am pro-American.
- Q. You say that sometime you would like to see Japan win and sometime the United States. What makes you feel that way?
- A. I don't know. I can't figure it out. Because it is not like it should be one woman for one husband and one man for one country. But I can't help it.
- Q. Would you be prepared to say which side you would fight on if you had to fight in the army of one or the other right now?
- A. I could fight on both sides. That is why I can't figure it out.
- Q. We can respect that feeling. Would you help a Japanese spy in this country if you had a chance? Suppose there was a Japanese spy over here who wanted to do something that would hurt the United States, Would you help him?
- A. Of course not. Because I tell you I am an artist not a politician.

 Don't like trouble at all. Have no reason.
- Q. If you were discharged from this camp and permitted to go back either to Manzanar or some other place and a Japanese spy came to you and wanted you to help him to do something against the United States what would you do?
- A. I won't help him for no reason.
- Q. Would you report him to the United States Army or police?
- A. No. I would not.
- Q. You just wouldn't have anything to do with it?
- A. Just stay neutral.
- Q. You wouldn't help him or you wouldn't report him to the authorities to help the United States?
- A. No
- Q. You wouldn't take any sides, one way or the other?
- A. No, sir.

- Q. Do you like the United States?
- A. Yes, sir. That is why I stay.
- Q. If you like this country and like to live here and this country helps you and makes you happy, why wouldn't you help this country?
- A. Because something inside me. Lots of time I think I been given lots of chance.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Japan.
- A. No, sir.
- Q. You want to stay in this country, yet you wouldn't help this country?
- A. Not against Japan. For some other purpose I would, yes.
- Q. How do you feel toward the Chinese?
- A. More chinese friends than Japanese in Los Angeles. Even Chinese think I am Chinese.
- 2. How do you feel toward England?
- A. Nothing, sir.
- Q. You don't feel either friendship or hatred?
- A. Not either way at all.
- Q. What is your feeling toward Germany?
- A. Because I don't like Germany at all. Ever since I heard about Yellow Peril.
- Q. How do you feel toward Russia?
- A. I don't like any Bolshevism. I don't like any "ism".
- A. How about Americanism? How do you like Americanism?
- A. I can't say, sir.
- Q. You know what it is?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Love of the United States?
- A. Yes, sir. It is very good for the Americans, sir.
- Q. Has it been good for you too?
- A. That helps a lot. That's why if I don't I am against United States a long time ago.
- Q. But you are not for the United States now? And you are not for the Japanese? Is that right?
- A. That is right.
- Q. If you want to say anything else, whether it is anything we have been asking about or anything you would like to say, go ahead. Take your time and be sure that we understand you. Is there anything you would like to say?

- A. I think not, sir.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Japan?
- A. No.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Manzanar?
- A. Yes, sir. Mr. Merritt would be glad to have me, sir. So would Mr. Raymond Best.
- (Mr. Toole) Q. Have you been a member of any Japanese societies?
 - A. Not at all.
 - Q. When you were at Manzanar were you a leader? Did you lead the people and make speeches?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Before you went to Manzaner?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Have you gone to any kind of an organization here in this camp?
 - A. No, sir. Only baseball, fishing.
 - Q. No organization?
 - A. No, sir.

(Mr. Mulroney)

- Q. Have you anything else you wish to say?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Do you think that you have had a fair hearing before this Board?
- A. Yes, I sure appreciate it, sir.
- Q. This Board can't make any final decision. We merely make a recommendation to the Attorney General. They review the findings and they make the decision. We will make a report and in due time the Attorney General will make the decision and you will be advised of it I assume.
- A. I don't care what the decision will be. One thing I would like to stay in the United States the rest of my life. That is one thing I would like.
- Q. How are you being treated?
- A. Best. I could stay all my life. No complaint about food. We got fishing, play golf.
- Q. Do you play golf?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. You have no complaints?
- A. We have no complaint here at all. I haven't heard of one complaint. That is true, sir.

RATMOND HIROSHI HIRAI, JAPANESE INTERNEE Fort Missoula, Montana December 10, 1943

PRESENT: Board Members (Examining Officers):

Mr. Bert H. Fraser, Officer in Charge

Internee: Raymond Hiroshi Hirai Stenographer: Miss Verna Hanson

MR. MULRONEY TO ALIEN:

Q. You are Raymond Hiroshi Hirai?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. How old are you?

A. 41 years.

Q. You were born in Japan?

A. Yes, in January, 1902.

Q. When did you first some to the United States?

A. 1917, August 1st.

Q. How much education did you have in Japan before coming to this country.

A. Just grammar school, sixth grade in other words.

Q. After coming to this country what schooling did you have?

A. College, sir.

Q. Where did you go?

A. South Jordan, Utah.

Q. After that?

A. Jordan High School, Sandy. Later transferred to Eastside High School, Salt Lake City.

Q. Did you graduate from high school?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. Where did you go after high school?

A. I went to college at Ogden, Utah.

- Q. How many years?
- A. Only about 8 months.
- Q. After that?
- A. Cornell University, Ithaca, New York.
- Q. Did you get any degree at college?
- A. Yes, sir. B.A.
- Q. How many years were you in college?
- A. Three years.
- Q. From Cornell where did you go?
- A. I did not go to any more school.
- Q. Where did you go to live?
- A. Sunnyside, Utah.
- Q. How did you obtain means, that is, money to go through Cornell?
- A. My father sent me and I worked as other school beys.
- Q. Was your father in this country or in Japan?
- A. Yes, sir. This country. He is not now but he was.
- Q. He helped you financially to go through school?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Where did you say you lived after you left Cornell?
- A. Sunnyside, Utah.
- Q. What was your occupation there?
- A. I worked in the coal mines, sir.
- Q. For how long?
- A. About 2 years, sir.
- Q. As a common laborer?
- A. No, sir. As a motor man and machine helper.
- Q. From there where did you go?
- A. Hollywood, California.
- Q. Hollywood?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you have a job in Hollywood before you went to Hollywood?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How did you obtain the job?
- A. Central Casting Bureau was looking for applicants and I applied.

- Q. What was your occupation in Hollywood?
- A. Extra at first. A movie extra.
- Q. What year was that?
- A. It was 1929.
- Q. Did you make enough to live on?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you do bit parts from time to time.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Where did you live during that period.
- A. Well, 2480 Canyon Drive, Hollywood.
- Q. Was that a Japanese settlement?
- A. No, sir. It was Canyon Drive.
- Q. For how many years were you thus employed in Hollywood?
- A. Ever since.
- Q. Ever since?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. As an actor?
- A. Yes, actor, technician, production manager.
- Q. What was your salary there?
- A. Well, when I was an extra I get about \$7.50. Later \$10.00 since 1934.
- Q. That is, per day?
- A. Yes, sir. If I get any better parts I get \$10.00 extra for each close-up.
- Q. In the early part of your answer when you said you were paid \$7.50, you meant \$7.50 per day?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. You were in that vocation when you were picked up by the Immigration Authorities?
- A. No.
- Q. What were you doing then?
- A. They don't use any more Japanese players since 1939, sir.
- Q. Since 1939 what did you do?
- A. I was working as a restaurant waiter.

- Q. For whom did you work?
- A. Jim's Cafe. Jim Emomoto.
- Q. Is that in Hollywood?
- A. No, in los Angeles
- Q. What was your salary there.
- A. \$18.00 per week.
- Q. During that period did you live in the same place?
- A. No.
- Q. You had to move?
- A. I moved to 4582 Main Street, Los Angeles.
- Q. Have you ever been married?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Have you any brothers or sisters in this country?
- A. Yes, sir. I have a brother, no sister, one brother.
- Q. Is your brother older or younger than you?
- A. Younger.
- Q. Where is your brother?
- A. I don't know. I lost track of him since the war.
- Q. Was he here at the time the war started?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Do you know as to whether or not he went back to Japan?
- A. I don't think so, sir, because he was born in this country.
- Q. Your brother was born in this country?
- A. Yes, sir. Sandy, Utah, 1914, August 11.
- Q. Have you any sisters in this country?
- A. No.
- Q. Have you any brothers or sisters in Japan?
- A. No.
- Q. You had but one brother and no sisters?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did your father come to this country at the same time you did?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Was he here before you?
- A. Yes.

Q. How many years was he herebefore you came?

A. When I was 100 days old my father left Japan. Sometime in 1902 about April.

- Q. Did your mother come with him.
- A. No, mother come in 1913.
- Q. Did you come with her?
- A. No.
- Q. Before her?
- A. After two years.
- Q. Has your father passed away?
- A. Yes.
- 4. And your mother?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You have no family here, not knowing where your brother is?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Now, will you tell us in regard to being taken into custody by the Immigration Authorities. After the Pearl Harbor incident?
- A. (no answer)
- Q. Perhaps you don't understand. Did the efficers pick you up?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. How did you come to be in the custody of the Immigration Service?
- A. Here is the story. It was March 22, 1942. Then the U. S. Government put someone in Relocation Center in Mansanar. At that time it was run by the Civilian Control Administration. The man was looking for volunteers. So I went on the day of March 21, 1942.
- Q. Did I hear you say you were not forced to go?
- A. Of course not, sir.
- Q. How many were in that camp?
- A. About 93 was there when I get there.
- Q. How many after that?
- A. Nearly 600 for our group. One train load. I don't know exact number but something like that.
- Q. At any rate, you went there in March, 1942?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. How long did you stay there?
- A. Until the December 6, 1942.
- Q. At which time you were taken to Moab?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How many people were there during the summer and fall?
- A. Nearly about 9 8,000.
- Q. Will you refer to an incident that happened there? About December 5, 1942. Do you know something about that incident that happened there?
- A. Yes.
- Q. When I speak of Fred Toyama, do you know who that is?
- A. Hes, he is a personal friend of mine, air.
- Q. Won't you go shead in your own way. Take your time and tell us with as much detail as you care to all about that incident and anything that you had to do with it, if anything?
- A. Well, I haven't any connections with whatever happened. But I was inside the police station at the time the incident occurred.
- Q. You were in the police station?
- A. Yes, inside the police station.
- Q. What was the incident?
- A. Later we so many reasons. I was not concerned in it. We studied later the first was because of the main incident which is a sugar shortage.
- Q. Did you learn on that day that this Fred Toyana had been assaulted?
- A. Yes, the next morning, sir.
- Q. Did you have anything to do with that? You had heard had you that some masked men beat him up?
- A. Yes, I heard that.
- Q. Were you one of them?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Do you know who they were?
- A. No, sir. We try to find out but we can't find who the leaders were. The way I heard some young kids 17-16 years old.
- Q. You heard they were 16-17 years old? The ones who did it?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. But you don't know the names of the 16-17 year old kids?
- A. No, sir.

- Q. You had nothing to do with it yourself?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Where were you when that happened?
- A. I was in my apartment, sir.
- Q. Was that the first knowledge you had that it happened?
- A. I was at Mr. Joe Blamey's apartment. He was a newspaper man, sir.
- Q. Was that at the camp?
- A. Yes, sir. In the Camp Barracks two eleven one.
- Q. Is Joe Blamey a Japanese man?
- A. Yes, sir. A half-breed, sir. Half Japanese, half Irish or something.
- Q. Is he a newspaper man?
- A. Editor. Editor of the Mansanar Free Press.
- Q. Is that a daily paper?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You say you were in his apartment?
- A. In his apartment.
- Q. How did you hear of the incident?
- A. Some other peporter came in his room to tell us that some one beat up Toyama.
- Q. Was anyone else there?
- A. A few other persons.
- Q. Then did you go out?
- A. I was stayed there.
- Q. About what time of the day or evening was that?
- A. It was pretty late in the evening, sir.
- Q. Did you leave the apartment at all that evening?
- A. Yes, I came home.
- Q. You went from Blamey's apartment to your own home?
- A. To my own, to tell my roommates what happened, what I heard.
- Q. Then you went to bed?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What occurred the next morning?
- A. I usually sleep late. I have a habit of sleeping until noon. I didn't get up until noon. Never get up until 11:30 in the morning. Even here I sleep late.

Q. When you got up, what did you do?

- A. I went into Mess Hall, then I heard the peoples talking about what happened last night. Well -
- Q. Was there a mass meeting?
- A. No.
- Q. Was there one at noon? A mass meeting during the noon hour or about 1 o'clock?
- A. I don't know, sir.
- Q. Where were you?
- A. I was in my room.
- Q. About 1 o'clock?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was there any mass meeting that afternoon or evening?
- A. The way I heard they had mass meeting.
- Q. How did you hear they had a mass meeting? Did someone tell you?
- A. Later in the police station I learn there had been a mass meeting.
- Q. You didn't hear the noise of a mass meeting?
- A. Yes, sir. When they come across to administration building I heard the noise.
- Q. You didn't leave your room?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. You did not attend any mass meeting?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. You did not make any talk? You took no part in any mass meeting?
- A. No.
- Q. At Camp Manzanar did you have something to do with the dramatic features of the camp.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What did you have to do with that?
- A. I was director of dramatics, sir.
- Q. Who placed you in that position?
- A. Mr. Nielson, sir.
- Q. Was he one of the officers at the camp?
- A. Yes, one of the officers in charge of the recreation department, sir.

- Q. Did you continue in that position during all of the time you were in Mansanar?
- A. No, sir. I had 2 jobs in Mansanar. One was Block Leader of Block 2.
- Q. The other one?
- A. Director of dramatics.
- Q. You did not continue to be director of dramatics?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. What caused you to discontinue that?
- A. I was suspended.
- Q. Way?
- A. Because someone else made a complaint, sir.
- Q. What was the complaint?
- A. Well, because I had heated argument with Mr. Nash, Project Director.
- Q. What was the argument about?
- A. Well, we figure this way. When one of the U. S. Government came into Manzanar and they promise to build a theatre and amusement hall. They started to build but Mr. Nash stopped it.
- Q. You did not like that?
- A. That is why I went to complain to Mr. Nash. Mr. Nash said if any man comes in to complain to this office I will kill him and bury in the sand so nobody know the difference. He said he had authority.
- Q. He told you that?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was anyone else present when he told you that?
- A. Yes, sir. Miss Barber, one of the secretaries.
- Q. Kr. Nash's secretary? Was she Japanese?
- A. No, American.
- Q. There was no other person who heard that?
- A. We talk so loud I guess all the people in the next room heard that.
- Q. You made that statement to the Immigration authorities and the FEI, did you?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. I have it here but I don't see where you told them that?
- A. Nobody asked me that question.

MR. FRASER:

He has never had a hearing

- Q. Were you interviewed by the Manzanar authorities.
- A. Yes.

MR. MULHONEY TO ALIEN:

- Have you ever told anyone before today that Mr. Nash said that if anyone complained he would kill him.
- A. Yes, I talk to Joe Blamey, Pressman and Mr. Raymond Best, Project Director of -
- Q. You told him? Anyone else?
- A. I told Mr. O'connor. He came to Moab.
- Q. Was Mr. O'Connor an officer of the law? From the FBI?
- A. He just come in Moab and ask us few questions.
- Q. You told him that too?
- A. Yes.
- Q. At the time you went into Mr. Wash's office was "r. Temple there?
- A. He was in the next room.
- Q. How many times did you go into Mr. Nash's office?
- A. Only 2.
- Q. Did you have any weapon in your hand either time?
- A. Not the first time, sir.
- Q. Was it when you went there the first time that Mr. Nash made the remark about killing someone?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Then you went out?
- A. No, sir. I talk plenty that time.
- Q. You were there a second time?
- A. Yes, two times, sir.
- Q. After awhile you went out?
- A. I didn't go out. Mr. Nash ran out.
- Q. After he ran out did you then leave Mr. Nash's office?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How long before you came back?
- A. I went in Recreation Department then. The secretary told me that Mr. Nielson think I am not fit to run the dramatic department so

then Mr. Mitani head of me. He music director. We had a meeting just a little before, present Mr. Nielson, Mr. Thomas Temple, few other relocation leaders. We select our own entertainment chief, Albert Nagashima. We don't want any new boss in our department.

- Q. I am trying to ask how long an interval passed from the time you left Mr. Nash's office until you went back?
- A. About 25 minutes.
- Q. When you went back the secon time then, after 25 minutes, did you have any weapon or anything in your hand.
- A. No weapon but a rock.
- Q. How big was the rock?
- A. About the size of a grapefruit.
- Q. Where did you get the rock?
- A. I always keep it in my room, sir.
- Q. Why do you always keep the rock in your room?
- A. Because I am a collector of petrified stones and rocks, even in here, sir.
- Q. You left your room to go to Mr. Nash's office?
- A. No, I didn't go to Mr. Nash's office I went to Nielson's office.
- Q. Before you left the room did you have the rock in your hand?
- A. Yes, I always carry the rock most of the time. Nice shape. Streak in it. I still have the rock here now.
- Q. You had the rock in your hand when you went to Mr. Nielson's office?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Who did you find in the office?
- A. The secretary and about 10-15 other boys and girls.
- Q. Who did you speak to in the office?
- A. The secretary and I don't -- I forget her name. Another fellow, a girl -
- Q. I don't care about them. Was Mr. Temple there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Mr. Nielson? Mr. Nash?
- A. No, because they are in Nielson's office. Their office in different building.
- Q. Who did you go there to see?
- A. Mr. Thomas Temple.

- Q. Was he there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Was that in the administration building?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you go inside the rail? Was their a railing there?
- A. I went in from the front door. Passed through the cashier's room and Mr. Hopper's room.
- Q. Did you strike the railing with the rock?
- A. I did not strike anything, but there was a few times when I struck the railing with the rock when I was talking
- Q. Were you mad?
- A. I wasn't mad that time because I am made before when I had heated argument with Nash.
- Q. The first time you were there you didn't have the rock?
- A. Of course not.
- Q. Did you speak in a loud angry manner the second time?
- A. Yes.
- Q. When you had the rock what were you mad about?
- A. Because Mr. Nielson, Mr. Temple said he don't know anything about it. So I teld him you are the man who did all this. Mr. Temple said nothing he just put his hands out and looked upward. Then later he said what made you think so. Then I tell him Mr. Nielson is to nice a kind of a man. He is not the kind of man to say such things.
- Q. Is that about all of the incident? Did two of your friends take you out of the room then?
- A. Yes, and out of the door.
- Q. Did you then go back into the room a second time?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Did Mr. Nielson come into the room while you were there?
- A. Yes. Mr. Mielson was standing by the door.
- Q. Did you then go to the recreation room?
- A. No, sir. I went directly home.
- Q. At some time did you go to the recreation room after this incident and did you speak there to a group of young women, and did you tell them that you turned Mr. Temple's deak ever.
- A. No.

Q. Did anything like that happen?

- A. No. I told them, almost everybody, that we had heated argument and looked like I was discharged.
- Q. After you had the heated argument were you discharged?
- A. No, I was still director of dramatics but looks like I am about to say good-bye to you all, girls etc.
- Q. We have a report here that after this incident, when you had the rock in the office, that you addressed a group of young women. Is that right?
- A. Yes, in the recreation department.
- Q. Did you tell those young women that you had turned Mr. Temple's desk over?
- A. No, sir. I did not.
- Q. Did you tell them that you were going to Kill Nash by hitting him over the head with a rock.
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Is there any truth in that?
- A. No, that proved by the court in Mansanar. It isn't true.
- Q. You were tried for that, weren't you?
- A. No, not exactly.
- Q. What were you tried for? You say it was proved in court?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q.. Were you tried before the Manzanar Judiciary Committee?
- A. Yes, sir. One thing I would like to say, This is the most important part. I had the argument with Mr. Mash because we had no 4th of July celebration at Mansanar in 1942. They should have. There was one reason, it was that Dr. Matini (Matani) who is in charge of the music department refused to play the Star Spangled Banner.
- Q. You were not pleased by that fact?
- A. No. I went up to Mr. Nach same day and told him why don't we have it. The Japanese in Manzanar at least half are pro-American. Why don't we have Spangled Banner in our 4th of July celebration? You guye squeaked too much to Mr. Nash. There is going to be no celebration. We let you all work. Funny thing. Newspaper print we had 4th of July celebration in Mansanar and people from cutside come to join. The army chase out of the gates. Newspaper print that we had a 4th of July celebration and the people came and were stopped outside the gates by the soldiers.

- Q. But that wasn't true?
- A. Yes, it was true.
- Q. But you didn't have the celebration?
- A. No, sir. Because I was supposed to be in charge of it. It was stopped because I had argument with Nash.
- Q. Getting back to our previous question what were you tried for?

 A. There is another thing I would like to say a few words about.

 During time of my conversation with Nash he say you are just like a man like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together. That's me he said. Better be quiet otherwise I bury you in the sand. There going to be no 4th of July celebration but we let you work.
- Q. Did he mean that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together?
- A. Yes, that what he tell me. That's why I said you are a damn liar. That's what the argument was.
- Q. Did you have the rock in your hand then?
- A. No. Not that time.
- Q. Was it the first or second time.
- A. This was the second.
- Q. Did you have the rock the time Mr. Nash made that remark?
- A. Yes, but Mr. Nash wasn't in the office. He was in San Francisco or somewhere else.
- Q. You said that Mr. Nash said to you that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin together?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Was that the day you went there with the rock in your hand?
- A. Same afternoon, sir.
- Q. Did you have the rock in your hand when he made the remark to you.
- A. No.
- Q. That would have been the first time you were in his office that day.
- A. Yes.
- Q. You went back afterward and had the rock in your hand the second time.
- A. Yes.
- Q. Mr. Nash wasn't there when you went back?
- A. No.
- Q. That was about 25 minutes after the first time?
- A. Yes.

- Q. After you went out the first time you went back to your apartment and got the rock?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Then you went back to the office.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Nash was not in the office when you went back with the rock the second time?
- A. Yes, he was not there.
- Q. Was Mr. Temple there?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. After Nash told you on your first visit there that he was like Hitler, Mussolini and Stalin you got mad and said 'you are a damn liar'. Then you went back to your apartment?
- A. No, I went back to the recreation hall.
- Q. Where did you have the rock?
- A. In my room, sir.
- Q. When you went to Nash's office the first time where was the rock?
- A. It was in my room.
- Q. Then when was it you went out of the office?
- A. It was in the morning second -
- Q. Take it easy now, don't misunderstand me. I understood you to say early in your testimony that after your first visit at the office it was about 25 minutes before you went back to that office.
- A. That is correct. Yes, sir.
- Q. During your first visit to the office the rock was in your apartment. Then you went out of the office at the end of the first visit.
- A. Yes.
- Q. When you went back about 25 minutes afterward and you had the rock. So you must have gone to your apartment to get the rock?
- A. True, sir. One thing you misunderstand. 25 minutes I go back room. I After I left Mr. Nash's office I went to my apartment and got the rock and then I went to Mr. Temple's office in 25 minutes. It was not until the afternoon that I went back to Nash's office.
- Q. Was Mr. Mash in his office when you went back in the afternoon?
- Q. He had gone to San Francisco. He was not in the camp?
- A. Yes.

- Q. You were tried for doing all this in the Mansanar Judiciary Committee?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What were the charges against you?
- A. Disorderly conduct.
- Q. Were you found guilty, or not guilty?
- A. Was found guilty and one day in jail.
- Q. Did you serve one day in jail?
- A. There was a government man there and one of the agentssfrom San Francisco heard my story. He said I don't have to stay in jail but said we would like you to go out. I am not guilty of charge or sentence. He said after the trial was over the chief of judiciary committe, Mr. Campbell, told me it was not enough evidence to convict so said I set you free. Have you got anything to say? So I told him it is not justice. True I admit I carry rock in administration building so I got to be guilty. I got to be convicted because I admit I am guilty. As long as we make a judiciary committee in Manzanar we got to follow, we have to carry it out.
- Q. You were tried on a morals charge? Did they find you guilty?
- A. No. Frame-up. They told me wait outside while -
- Q. Did they also tell you that you were barred for a period of 8 months from having anything to do with dramatics or entertainment?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. It is said that you violated that order, that you did take some part in entertainment?
- A. I did. This is the way. This is the whole thing. Got to tell everything true I did, sir, because we had entertainment for the time when Mr. Merritt arrive I go personally to Mr. Merritt. Lots of undercurrents go on in Manzanar. Some day they would bust up. So the best way I told him I am supposed to be carrying on my performance in Manzanar until April.
- Q. Who did you say that to.
- A. To Mr. Merrit. I explain to him I had trouble with Nash. Mr. Merritt said it is all right I give you special permission for putting on show. I told him, I ask Mr. Merritt, you come to that show be sure at 8 o'clock. The minute I arrive I introduce you to all the people than I ask you to come on the stage and have a few words for us. He says I give you permission. He came November 28 or 29 about a week before the riot happens. It was Saturday night, I guess.

- Q. You know that we are at war with Japan?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How do you feel about that? Who do you want to win? You can talk to us frankly.
- A. It was very funny. You see sometime I hope Japan to win, sometime I hope United States to win. I was born in Japan. I am subject to Japan by birth. I come to this country when I was 15 years old. I don't know any much of Japan but I live in this country 26 years continuously. That is why lots of time when I was in the picture show, when I went in the show and saw the American flag I always clap my hands and stand up. Lots of people are accusing me I am pro-American.
- Q. You say that sometime you would like to see Japan win and sometime the United States. What makes you feel that way?
- A. I don't know. I can't figure it out. Because it is not like it should be one woman for one husband and one man for one country. But I can't help it.
- Q. Would you be prepared to say which side you would fight on if you had to fight in the army of one or the other right now?
- A. I could fight on both sides. That is why I can't figure it out.
- Q. We can respect that feeling. Would you help a Japanese spy in this country if you had a chance? Suppose there was a Japanese spy over here who wanted to do something that would hurt the United States, Would you help him?
- A. Of course not. Because I tell you I am an artist not a politician.

 Don't like trouble at all. Have no reason.
- Q. If you were discharged from this camp and permitted to go back either to Manzanar or some other place and a Japanese spy came to you and wanted you to help him to do something against the United States what would you do?
- A. I won't help him for no reason.
- Q. Would you report him to the United States Army or police?
- A. No, I would not.
- Q. You just wouldn't have anything to do with it?
- A. Just stay neutral.
- Q. You wouldn't help him or you wouldn't report him to the authorities to help the United States?
- A. No
- Q. You wouldn't take any sides, one way or the other?
- A. No, sir.

- Q. Do you like the United States?
- A. Yes, sir. That is why I stay.
- Q. If you like this country and like to live here and this country helps you and makes you happy, why wouldn't you help this country?
- A. Because something inside me. Lots of time I think I been given lots of chance.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Japan.
- A. No, sir.
- Q. You want to stay in this country, yet you wouldn't help this country?
- A. Not against Japan. For some other purpose I would, yes.
- Q. How do you feel toward the Chinese?
- A. More chinese friends than Japanese in Los Angeles. Even Chinese think I am Chinese.
- 2. How do you feel toward England?
- A. Nothing, sir.
- Q. You don't feel either friendship or hatred?
- A. Not either way at all.
- Q. What is your feeling toward Germany?
- A. Because I don't like Germany at all. Ever since I heard about Yellow Peril.
- Q. How do you feel toward Russia?
- A. I don't like any Bolshevism. I don't like any "ism".
- A. How about Americanism? How do you like Americanism?
- A. I can't say, sir.
- Q. You know what it is?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Love of the United States?
- A. Yes, sir. It is very good for the Americans, sir.
- Q. Has it been good for you too?
- A. That helps a lot. That's why if I don't I am against United States a long time ago.
- Q. But you are not for the United States now? And you are not for the Japanese? Is that right?
- A. That is right.
- Q. If you want to say anything else, whether it is anything we have been asking about or anything you would like to say, go ahead. Take your time and be sure that we understand you. Is there anything you would like to say?

- A. I think not, sir.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Japan?
- A. No.
- Q. Would you like to go back to Manzanar?
- A. Yes, sir. Mr. Merritt would be glad to have me, sir. So would Mr. Raymond Best.
- (Mr. Toole) Q. Have you been a member of any Japanese societies?
 - A. Not at all.
 - Q. When you were at Manzanar were you a leader? Did you lead the people and make speeches?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Before you went to Manzanar?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Have you gone to any kind of an organization here in this camp?
 - A. No, sir. Only baseball, fishing.
 - Q. No organization?
 - A. No, sir.

(Mr. Mulroney)

- Q. Have you anything else you wish to say?
- A. No, sir.
- Q. Do you think that you have had a fair hearing before this Board?
- A. Yes, I sure appreciate it, sir.
- Q. This Board can't make any final decision. We merely make a recommendation to the Attorney General. They review the findings and they make the decision. We will make a report and in due time the Attorney General will make the decision and you will be advised of it I assume.
- A. I don't care what the decision will be. One thing I would like to stay in the United States the rest of my life. That is one thing I would like.
- Q. How are you being treated?
- A. Best. I could stay all my life. No complaint about food. We got fishing, play golf.
- Q. Do you play golf?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. You have no complaints?
- A. We have no complaint here at all. I haven't heard of one complaint.
 That is true, sir.



As for me, I am quite well, but little change has taken place except we were moved to here, Leupp Isolation Camp since your departure. In this camp, everything make me resent because the most of the people are act as if they were lost their Japanese pride. So the, there is few of the things what make me pleasure.

May I entreat your kindly manage to call me to your camp? Now Iam pure Japanese not so much after I renounced my American citizenship as after the war broken out between Japan and America.

On account of the talks, everythings in your camp as well as internment camp are very well to us Japanese for act as in Japanese way, I have done all that seem to be possible to get in internment camp, but it was impossible for myself.

Please make every efforts to call me to your camp as possible as you can. I will be very kx appreciate to your kindness.

Please take good care of yourself and give my best regards to rest of men who were Moab camp. I will hear from you soon.

The interment orders dated March 5, 1943, in the cases of the above named Japanese nationals were received at this office on March 9, 1943, but cines no previous record could be found in any of the cases. Mr. Kulp and Mr. Stowart of this office telephoned Mr. Messermen who stated that the aliens were involved in a riet at the Messener Relocation Center, and for that reason their cases were referred to your effice with recommendations that the aliens be ordered intermed, and they were transferred to the Mar Relocation Center at Monb. Utah. Mr. Messermen stated that Presidential Marrante issued on the same date as the interment orders had been forwarded to the Mar Relocation Authorities. He requested that this Service gain custedy of the aliens and transfer them to an interment case.

Mr. Stowert pointed out that since the aliens had not yet been apprehended under alien enemy proceedings they should be taken into custody by the Federal Duresu of Investigation and not by this Service. Mr. Vessermen suggested that insumen as the Presidential Verrants had been forwarded to the Ver Helecation Authorities this office instruct the representative of this Service at Salt Lake City. Utah to refer the matter to the Halt Lake City office of the Federal Bureau of investigation, and unless they wished to apprehend the aliens, officers of this Service do so.

This office then transmitted the interment orders to the Divisional Director of this Service at Salt Lake City with the instructions suggested by Mr. Vassermen.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation at Calt Lake City apprehended the aliens at the Federation Center and delivered



them to the Sounty Jail at Sond, Utch, notifying the United States Attorney at Salt Lake City, who in turn requested the United States Marshal to convey them to the detention facility at Salt Labe City. The Divisional Director at Balt Lake City has published a report dated Harch 17, 1943, a copy of which is enclosed, from which it will be noted that the apprehending officers did not permit the eliens to obtain any clothing other than that which they were wearing at the time of their arrest nor any other personal effects, and that at the time of their delivery at Salt Lake City, they were without hate or coats. It will also be noted that when Agent Cleon of the Federal Bureau of Investigation at Selt Lake City was informed in the metter, he stated that warrants of excet covered persons only and that the Vederal Bureau of Investigation had no facilities to transport personal effects of persons arrested. The report further indicates that it was necessary to delay the transfer of the aliens to an interment compontil their clothing and other offects were transferred from Meab to Salt Lake City by orgrans at the expense of this Service.

It is thought that you may desire to ocquaint Mr. Noover with the facts stated in the enclosure and suggest that if the Federal Bureau of Investigation has no facilities to take care of personal effects and baggage of allows whom they apprehend under similar circumstances, arrangements be made for officers of this Service to make the apprehensions.




Reference is made to our telegram of March 15th concerning the arrests and delivery to the detention facility at Salt Lake City of the above named Japanese alien enemies.

Upon arrival in Salt Lake City, the subjects stated that at the time of the arrests at the Relocation Center, Moab, Utah, they were not permitted to obtain any clothing other than that worn by them, or any other personal effects of any class. All were delivered to the temporary detention facility without hats, coats or other personal effects.

Of the Federal Bureau of Investigation was contacted relative to the matter and stated that warrants of arrests covered the persons only, and further, that the F.E.I. had no facilities to transport personal effects of persons arrested.

Immediately after arrest, the subjects were conveyed to the County jail at Moab, Utah, by the arresting agents. The United States Attorney at Salt Lake City was notified of their arrests and he in turn, requested the United States marshal to convey them to the temporary detention facility at Salt Lake City. The Deputy United States Marshal who conveyed them to Salt Lake City, was contacted and stated that he had no knowledge of any of the subjects' personal effects other than those they had with them at the time he took them into custody at the county jail in Moab.

This effice had planned to convey the subjects to Fort Missoula immediately upon their arrival in Salt Lake City in accordance with instructions contained in Central Office letter of March 9th. However, due to inclement weather, the said lack of clothing and the believe that their conveyance to Fort Missoula without proper clothing is not in accord with the humane treatment required by Central Office Instruction No. 58, the subjects were retained in Salt Lake City pending arrangements to secure their clothing and other personal effects from the Relocation Center at Moab, Utah.

The Camp commander at Moab was contacted by telephone yesterday and stated that he would, at the earliest opportunity, send by express "collect" to this Service, all clothing and other personal effects of the subjects.

This matter is called to your attention as it appears to the writer that this Service has been winecessarily inconvenienced and has had winecessary expense due probably, to a lack of understanding on the part of the other Agencies concerned. This procedure has invariably been followed in the past in similar cases.

Upon the arrival of the subjects' clothing and other personal effects, they will be conveyed to Fort Missoula for internment.

Mr. Wasserman advised telephonically this date that the subject of this file was involved in a shooting which occurred at the Mansanar Relocation Center and his case, was, therefore, referred to the Alien Enemy Control Unit with a recommendation that the subject be interned as an alien enemy. Pursuant to that request and upon the evidence presented to that Unit an internment order was issued and a Precidential Warrant was issued on the same date, the latter document being transmitted to the War Relocation Authorities. Mr. Wasserman requested that this Service gain custody of the alien from the Relocation Project and transfer the subject to the Army for internment for the duration of the War. He stated that the files of the Alien Enemy Control Unit do not indicate the nature of the detention station at Moab, Utah but he assumes that it is operated by the War Relocation Authority.

The Director, Alien Enemy Control Unit, telephoned this office stating that the Presidential Warrants are being transmitted to the War Relocation Authorities with information that officers of this Service will get in touch with the Camp Commander concerning removing the sliens from the Center and transferring them to another camp for internment.

Please get in touch with the Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation there and ascertain whether they desire to take the aliens into custody at the Center and deliver them to your office. If so, you should notify the Camp Commander to that effect. If not, your office should take the sliens into custody. At any rate, the aliens should be transferred to Fort Missoula, Montara, unless instructions to the contrary are issued prior to the time they are moved.

WHEREAS, Raymond Hiroshi Hirai, of Manzanar Relocation Center, now being detained at Moab, Utah, a subject of Japan, over the age of fourteen years, is within the United States and has heretofore been apprehended as being potentially dangerous to the public peace and safety of the United States; and it appearing from the evidence before me that said alien enemy should be interned; NOW, THEREFORE, upon consideration thereof,

IT IS ORDERED that said alien enemy be interned.




